A busy construction season for the scale crew

The scale crew has installed five truck scales so far this year - three were WSI pit scales and two were Rice Lake above ground scales. The sixth scale installation starts the first week of October. Huron Energy, an ethanol plant, is getting a WSI 120' x 12' pit scale. This scale is being built in Shop 2.

Jamie and Trent have been busy with scale service work every day since mid-April! They recently had a very unusual scale problem to solve on a Rice Lake scale in Watertown. After some initial testing, Jamie said they discovered that all the wires had been cut between the scale sections by someone using an ice scraper, someone who probably thought that they were just cleaning between the sections!

This scale project in DeGraff, Minnesota for Glacial Plains Co-Op was started in mid-August, and the scale crew has now completed the installation. The scale will be put into

service in mid-October.

On a rare day when Joey Okroi was not on the road servicing or installing scales, he was busy in Shop 1 doing prep work on some scale parts.

By following Ken's drawing to set up the drill press, he was drilling two holes in each 8" x 18" steel plate, and there were 200 of these plates stacked up to be machined. These plates are used on the main levers on the WSI scales that are built in Shop 2.

When Joey finished drilling the holes, these parts went to Shop 2. It is important to have parts like this ready to go when a scale has been ordered.




The concrete crew recently completed work on a 350' x 16' concrete cow slab at Joel's place.

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Behind the scenes with the shop crews



Stacy has been working on Semi #36. The Cummins engine was taken out and a used Cummins engine purchased to use for replacement parts. He anticipates #36 should be back on the road the first part of October, but is waiting for parts.

Dump truck #99 is waiting in the shop for a head replacement.

Shop 1



One of the scale weight carts broke an axle in September. JD first did some welding on it, and then Jason and Jamie had it in Shop 1 (photo top right) where the axle surface was refaced using a dial indicator to make it even again.





The second weight cart was in Shop 1 for wiring connection problems. Jamie and Trent opened it up looking for the problem, and Stacy and Ken were also consulted about the problem.

For testing scales, BOTH carts are needed, so getting both back into service is a priority.

Shop 2

JD, Buck and Joey U. have been working on another portable scale in Shop 2. That has been set aside for now as they are building the 120' x 12' pit scale for Huron Energy.

JD shared that 90% of the steel for the scales comes from West Central Steel in Minnesota. When Ken orders steel, he orders the big stuff like I-beams, for three scales at a time. This is enough to fill a trailer load to be delivered.

Once the construction season is over, equipment will be coming to this shop and the crew will be busy with repair work.

Construction Division

We started job #2302 three weeks ago. It is a DOT job which involves two box culverts. Site 1 is a triple barrel 10' x 6' box culvert and Site 2 is a double barrel 11' x 6' box culvert. We have built two traffic diversions. There was a lot of fabric on those and 1,100 tons of rip rap at the creek bottoms.

We moved traffic to the diversions on Monday, September 25th. We milled the highway on the 26th, and the next day we started demolition work at Site 1.

Dawson loaded all the trucks with fill dirt from the Barrow pit. Eric dozed it all out, and Zach has been doing a little bit of everything. We hired Lana Rencountre to flag for us after we moved traffic to the diversions. She is also learning how to run the ground controls on the milling machine. Eric is currently digging out the box to demo it.

Tim and crew have continued work on Project #2304 that was first reported on in the August newsletter. This is a South Dakota DOT project in Hutchinson, McCook and Yankton counties.

We got done 15 miles south of Freeman and it is paved and painted. We are now just a mile south of Freeman and should be done with this one next week, and then we will be moving north and east of Freeman on Highway 42 to do two more sets of turn lanes.

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It's that time of year...

Be on the lookout for deer while you are on the road this fall season. Insurance claims for collisions with animals rise significantly in the fall when deer are mating, with

November having the highest claim frequency.

How to avoid collisions with deer this fall:

• Slow down. Watch for deer, especially around dawn and between the hours of 6 p.m. and 9 p.m. when they're most active. Use your high beams when possible at those times.



- **Be aware.** Look out for deer-crossing signs and wooded areas where animals are likely to travel.
- **Brake, don't swerve.** Swerving to avoid an animal can put you are risk for hitting another vehicle or losing control of your vehicle. Instead, just slow down as quickly and safely as you can. Your odds for surviving an accident are better when hitting an animal than when hitting another car.
- **Assume they have friends.** "Where there's one, there are usually more" often holds true. Deer travel in groups, so if you see one run across the road, expect others to follow.
- **Buckle up.** A seat belt is your best defense for minimizing your risk in a crash. Most of the people killed in animal-vehicle collisions weren't wearing their seat belts.

If you hit an animal, move your vehicle safely off the road. Call the police or animal control, and photograph the scene. Call your insurance company when you get home.

DRIVER REMINDERS!

- 1. When driving a truck or equipment on a gravel road and a vehicle is approaching, it is our policy to slow down and move over until they pass.
- 2. Also, ALL drivers of company vehicles and equipment are reminded that you are expected to clean up and dispose of any garbage in your company property at the end of EVERY day.
- 3. And remember, DO NOT put aluminum cans in the burning barrel. There is a blue barrel located near the burning barrel for your alumi-

num cans.
